Lombard St., Baltimore, MD 21201; Hours: M-F 8:00-5:00; Phone 443-573-2800) no later than the close of business on Monday, January 16, 2006.

In order to be given your permit at the January 20th pick-up, you will need to bring a photo ID and your vehicle registration(s). You may serve as a proxy for someone else and pick up their permit provided you show a photo ID and vehicle registration for that person.

Also, everyone needs to be aware that the designation of the **north** side of the 100 block of W. Clement Street is changing from Area A to Area 30 as of January 1, 2006. Please remind our residents that they should not park there if they are not in possession of an Area 30 permit.

In attendance were the Committee, City Planner Beth Strommen, owners of the property and their architect. The owners agreed to resubmit corrected drawings and plans to BMZA showing all changes including additions, windows, and decks for a zoning appeals hearing. The zoning appeals hearing will also be to sub-divide the property into 3 single dwelling units. The drain pipes dumping water on the sidewalks will also be removed when sidewalks are raised for BG&E work. The owners also agreed to get all the proper permits for this project.

This meeting was brought about by concerned and vigilant members of our community. This is our community and we will not tolerate the disrespect, lack of community input and the failing of due process by certain builders/contractors. How to Help Your Neighbors Help the City

Everyone knows that the city is hard up for cash. If you're one of the few who are paying attention, you know that the city knows that certain communities are cash cows for revenue. I'm not saying that South Baltimore is one of them, but have you looked at your property taxes recently? Do you know they are going up on January 1? When was your last parking ticket? Does it really cost \$30 to issue a sticker? Let's not forget all the other taxes inculcated upon us: Want to sell your house? Recordation tax. Want to heat your home? Energy tax. Call your mom? Telecommunications tax. Pay your property tax? Yes, but not until after you pay your income tax. And on and on.

But I digress.

I learned long ago that if you can't beat them, then join them. In that vein, I propose yet another measure to help fund a municipal budget currently in the throes of an accelerating deficit: Make friends with your lazy neighbors who refuse their civic duty of shoveling their sidewalk by calling 311 and having a Sanitation Officer dispatched to remind aforementioned neighbor that if one lives *in* the city, then one is, by extension, also responsible *for* the city. THOR'S CRAB QUICHE Great recipe idea for New Year's Eve!

Ingredients:

- 1 pastry shell (9 inch), par tially baked
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 tablespoons shallots, minced
- 1 cup crabmeat
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 1/2 cups Swiss cheese, shredded/divided
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup half and half
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- dash white pepper or hot pepper sauce
- dash nutmeg
- minced parsley

Preperation:

Have a 9-inch pastry shell partially baked. Sauté shallots in butter until tender, about 2 minutes; mix with crabmeat and flour; set aside. Sprinkle 3/4 cup the cheese in the pie shell, then spread with crab mixture. Sprinkle with remaining 3/4 cup of cheese. Beat eggs, cream, salt, pepper, nutmeg, and parsley until mixed. Pour into shell. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 6 to 8.

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

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


