

IN YOUR OWN BACKYARD



To celebrate Women's History Month, Mount Clare Museum House is pleased to offer a special exhibit entitled *Margaret Tilghman Carroll – Revolutionary Woman*. From March 1, 2006 until May 13, 2006 this exhibit will focus on Margaret's life at Mount Clare from 1763 until 1817. Visitors will be treated to special guided tours in which they can experience the lifestyle of a wealthy plantation mis-

tress in 18th and early 19th century Maryland.

In 1763, the Maryland Gazette described Charles Carroll. Barrister's new bride as "a young lady of great Merit, Beauty, and Fortune." With her marriage to Charles, two of the most prominent families in the region were united. After Charles' death in 1783, Margaret continued living at Mount Clare until she died there in 1817 – having never remarried. Mount Clare today reflects the personality of Margaret perhaps more than any other single person. Several rare objects from the Mount Clare collection will be displayed for a limited time during this exhibit, including Margaret Carroll's c.1770 silk gown and her 1817 Will that provides freedom for the people enslaved at Mount Clare. Other exclusive objects include two portraits of Margaret by Charles Willson Peale, and personal objects belonging to other prominent American women.

Mount Clare - Minutes from the Inner Harbor...Centuries Away! This National Historic landmark is Maryland's finest example of a Georgian country estate. Baltimore's oldest house was the home of Charles Carroll, Barrister and his wife Margaret Tilghman Carroll. It sits majestically in historic Carroll Park in southwest Baltimore. Original family furnishings depict the grand style of 18th century colonial living. Managed by the National Society of the Colonial Dames of America. Mount Clare became Maryland's first house museum in 1917. Open Tuesday through Saturday for guided tours beginning at 10am. Last tour begins at 3:00 pm. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$5 for seniors and \$4 for students. 5 and under free. The Mount Clare Stable is located west of the mansion and is available for rentals


