### PRESIDENT'S CORNER

As I walk through the neighborhood, I often hear people muttering under their breath "They should do something about that" when something doesn't look right.

Have you ever wondered who "They" are? Guess what: YOU are.
The City of Baltimore and your neighborhood associations work hard to provide services and assistance to our South Baltimore residents, but the truth is, if each individual doesn't start working to improve their homes, streets, and blocks, then there isn't much that the larger organizations can do.

How can YOU become "They"?

**Get involved.** Start coming to the SBIC neighborhood meetings to voice your opinions, ideas and suggestions. Go on the COP walks to learn how to work more effectively with the police. Call 311 to report trash and other problems in your area.

If something is wrong, fix it. If you see a piece of paper blowing down the street, try picking it up and throwing it in a trash receptacle. If a park bench is out of place, try moving it back. If you see weeds, try pulling them. Treat this neighborhood like it's your own.

**Don't mess the neighborhood up in the first place.** For example, if your dog goes to the bathroom in the park, pick it up — and follow through all the way to a trash can, don't just make a pile of waste-filled plastic bags in the corner of the park. Don't give money to homeless people. Don't feed the pigeons. If you aren't using your mattresses, wait for trash day to throw them out. Have some pride.

We want you all to love living in South Baltimore, and the first step to creating an inviting place to live starts with you. We will support you all the way as you start treating this neighborhood like something you are proud to call your own. Together we will make our part of the peninsula a great place to live.

Winter snowfalls bring the responsibility of sidewalk maintenance. You will receive a citation if you fail to clear the snow in front of your house. As you shovel be grateful your not in the suburbs with a driveway to maintain.

This plea is directed to all the fit and svelte bodies in South Baltimore. Giving 30 minutes a week to sweep and bag leaves is a wonderful way to give back to your neighborhood. Give up a morning run or time at the gym to "work out" on your block. Your elderly neighbor who doesn't have adequate health or energy to do the task will benefit from your thoughtfulness

The last 2 cleanups were scheduled early in the month so we were unable to recruit volunteers at the SBIC meetings. We need email addresses for those volunteers who want notification just prior to cleanups. We have noted great improvement in two locations that were habitual trouble spots. These are the Leatherite building on Randall and The Stonewall Jackson Democratic Club on Charles. Unfortunately the old Revco building on Fort and the 1600 block of Olive are continually abused by illegal dumpers! We continue to encourage a call to 311 to report all dumping even after the fact!!

Trash collection will occur on scheduled days during the holiday season. This was confirmed with city officials.

The sitting park at the corner of Light and Heath is in need of long-term solutions for care and maintenance. Part of fence surrounding the property has been removed and it is not secured. Thomas Johnson Elementary has been unable to utilize the space as planned. Principal Sasiadek has requested SBIC to reassume responsibility for the park. Neighbors living near Light and Heath may have a special interest in getting involved. Please contact Amy Mutch if you are interested in helping with this project.



I just finished reading *Seeds of Deception* by Jeffrey Smith. I found it so disturbing that I have to share the information with you. The book is about genetically modified food. Before you say, "I don't care," please keep reading because it directly impacts YOUR health.

Here is a simple definition of a genetically modified organism (GMO): a gene is inserted into the gene of a different species to modify it to get a desired result that is not normally occurring. 

#### **Toxic Plants:**

There are several plants that can be harmful or poisonous to pets. Below are some of the more common ones encountered this time of year.

**Poinsettia**: Low toxicity, chewing or ingesting the leaves and stems can result in vomiting and/or diarrhea, and increased salivation.

**Christmas greens:** All parts of these plants are low toxicity, but can cause vomiting and diarrhea after ingestion.

Holly: The leaves and berries have moderate to severe toxicity. Symptoms include vomiting, diarrhea and central nervous system (CNS) depression. Mistletoe: All parts of this plant are very toxic, but especially the berries. Vomiting and diarrhea are common, but other symptoms include changes in heart rate, trouble breathing, seizures, and coma. Death can occur in severe intoxication. (I would recommend using fake mistletoe.) If your pet has ingested any of these plants, and you notice symptoms, please make sure to seek veterinary assistance.

#### The Holiday Kitchen:

There are many hazards in the holiday kitchen, and most pets keep a watchful eye during holiday baking and cooking, in hopes that a tasty morsel might drop on the floor. Many foods, like baked goods, ham, turkey, and other rich food can cause serious illness and danger to our four legged friends. Chocolate of all kinds, but especially semisweet and baking chocolate, is toxic to pets. Symptoms of choco-



(B'More Green, Continued from page 5) port any of its genetically modified products to Europe (which is bad for the US economy). The US has tried donating genetically modified foods to third world countries and even they have rejected them out of safety concerns!

So what is so bad about these GMOs? While there are too many reasons and too many examples to detail in full in this article, here are a few. Genetic engineers continually encounter unintended side effects – genetically modified plants create toxins, react to weather differently, contain too many or too few nutrients, become diseased and die. The genetically modified foods have components which promote cell division. Uncontrolled cell division is the hallmark of a cancer tumor. Rats fed genetically modified feed in laboratory studies have developed precancerous stomach lesions and many have died. Antibiotic resistant bacteria are a huge problem that I see in the hospital every day and that you may have read about in the news. Antibiotic resistant markers are used in the process of making genetically modified foods. The biotech companies like Monsanto that make genetically modified products have insisted that the resistant genes cannot be transferred into the human body. But in the late 1980's, "animal feeding studies confirmed that [antibiotic resistant] DNA not only survives, it is found in the blood, intestinal wall. liver, spleen and feces, and even remains intact in the digestive system for more than 5 days." They have found this to be true for humans as well.

When given the choice between genetically-modified and nongenetically modified food, rats, cows, and other animals consistently refuse to eat the modified food. Yet, this is what we Americans eat on daily basis! No one realizes it because the US government does not require genetically modified foods to be labeled. The FDA has ignored recommendations by its own scientists by approving genetically modified foods All the facts in this article come from without requiring safety tests. The FDA actually does no testing for GMOs but instead relies on tests submitted by the biotech companies that

are applying for approval of their product. Researchers have found significant problems with the research submitted by biotech companies. For example, Monsanto used stronger stomach acid and more than 1,250 times the amount of a digestive enzyme recommended by international standards to prove how quickly their genetically modified protein degraded in the stomach.

I highly recommend that you avoid eating the following foods which are genetically modified: soy (85% in the US is genetically modified), canola (75%), corn (40%), food additives, enzymes, flavorings, processing agents, soy flour, soy protein, soy lecithin, corn syrup, dextrose, maltodextrin, fructose, citric acid, lactic acid, Aspartame (NutraSweet), Quest tobacco, meat, eggs and dairy products from animals fed genetically modified feed, and dairy products from cows injected with rbGH. A basic rule of thumb is to buy organic as much as possible and avoid any processed foods that contain corn, soy or dairy. Buy your groceries from Whole Foods and Trader Joe's as they have pledged not to stock any genetically modified products. Gerber baby has also pledged not to use GMOs. Money is power. Companies want to make a profit, and if no one is buying their GMO products, they will switch. Look at Europe: due to civilian outcry, the governments outlawed genetically modified food and companies have switched in order to continue making money. Write to Congress and demand that foods be labeled. We should have a choice as to whether or not we eat genetically modified foods but since nothing is labeled, it makes it hard to make an informed choice. YOU should be able to have control over your heath. We can't leave it to the biotech companies! Visit www.seedsofdeception.com for a sample letter to Congress. (Healthy Pets, Continued from page 9) late toxicity can range from vomiting and diarrhea, to high blood pressure, tremors, heart arrhythmias, seizures, and death. Bones from turkey, chicken, ham, etc. can cause gastrointestinal (GI) upset, choking, or intestinal obstruction, and should not be given to pets. Table scraps, or any food that is not your pet's normal diet, can cause GI upset. Be careful about treats and table scraps and caution any guests to not feed your pet any of these "special treats".

#### **Trees and Decorations:**

Christmas trees and glass ornaments can prove to be dangerous, particularly to cats. Since cats are notorious for trying to climb trees, make sure to stabilize it properly to avoid the tree falling over. In the past I have wired ornaments to the tree with floral wire to prevent my large dog from knocking off the ornaments with his overly aggressive wagging tail. Place breakable ornaments out of your pet's reach to avoid cuts from broken glass. Any ornament, decoration, tinsel, yarn, or ribbon can be a choking hazard or cause an intestinal obstruction if ingested. Electrical cords should be covered and tacked down because chewing on electrical cords can result in electrocution.

#### Safe Travel:

If you are traveling with your pet for the holidays, make sure to have proper identification on your pet, including a local phone number or your cell phone. Microchipping your pet is always the best way to ensure its safe return. If you are traveling a long distance, make sure to bring plenty fresh food and water for your pet. Holiday traffic jams can keep you in the car much longer than expected and it is always a good idea to have emergency needs for your pet readily avail-

#### **Giving Pets As Gifts**

Remember that there are thousands of animals in Shelters each year in the months following the holidays. Many of these animals were impulsive purchases, and once the recipients realized the impact of training a puppy, or the daily routine of changing the litter box, they decided to turn in their animals. If you do plan to give a pet to loved one for Christmas, don't forget to stop by the local animal shelters and rescue groups. There are hundreds of wonderful animals for adoption in need of loving homes.
