Last month the Executive Committee held several meetings with Ray Horseman, the owner of Rayzer's, a small bar on the corner of Randall and Harden Court that had been the subject of much discussion between nearby residents at the time of the bar's annual liquor license renewal.

Through these meetings, we were able to come to some agreements with the owner of Rayzer's about what could be done to limit the noise and external activity near the bar. The agreements include:

- Exterior lights on both Randall St. and Harden Court will be maintained in proper working order.
- The side door on Harden Court and the front door on Randall St. will be closed after 8 pm, or when the juke box is being used, or when there are more than 5 patrons in the bar
- Interior and exterior video cameras will remain in functioning order
- The owners and bar staff will report instances of loitering and/or suspected drug transactions within 100 feet of the premises to 911 immediately
- The owners will meet with the commander of the Baltimore Police Department Southern District and SBIC redevelop a plan for removal of criminal activity on the sidewalks and the alley behind the bar.

If these conditions are not being met, please contact Marie Sennett at 410.837.1132 or sennettmarie@yahoo.com and we will relay concerns to the owner of Rayzer's for correction.

We hope for a more positive relationship between the immediate neighbors and this establishment in the future, based on improved communication and cooperation in respecting everyone's rights in the neighborhood – residents and business owners alike.

The Chair of the Design Review Committee of SBIC along with the Chair of Historic Federal Hill Main Street met with Mr. Jake Ruppert of Ruppert Homes to discuss his proposal for eight new townhouses at 1100 S. Charles Street (formerly Cross Street Automotive). This project includes ground floor storefront for retail on Charles Street, and off-street parking for each unit. LIQUOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE

By Al Evans

Senate Bill 344 (SB344) by Senator George Della went into effect June 1, 2006 which states in part that:

"This bill requires the Baltimore City Board of Liquor License Commissioners to consider, before approving an application and issuing an alcoholic beverage license: (1) the public need and desire for the license; (2) the number and location of existing licenses and the potential effect on existing licensees of license applied for; (3) the potential commonality or uniqueness of the services and products to be offered by the applicant's business; (4) the impact on the general health, safety, and welfare of the community; and (5) any other necessary factors as determined by the board.

Bill Summary: The license application must be disapproved and the license for which the application is made must be refused if the board finds that (1) the granting of the license is not necessary for the accommodation of the public; (2) the applicant is not fit to receive the license; (3) the applicant has made a material false statement in the application; (4) the applicant has practiced fraud in connection with the application; (5) the operation of the business, if the license is granted, will unduly disturb the peace of the residents of the neighborhood in which the establishment is to be located; or (6) there are any other reasons, in the board's discretion, why the license should not be issues.

Upon receipt of an application for new license, a license transfer, a license class change, a request for live entertainment on the licensed premises, or an extension of the licensed premises, the Baltimore City Board of Liquor License Commissioners must advertise and post notice of the application or request. The board must hold a public hearing on each request for a new license, a license class change, a request for live entertainment, or an expansion of the licensed premises."

As licensees investigate ways to grow their businesses and see expansion as a viable alternative, keep in mind that you can have a voice. The public hearings are a great way for you to show your support for your local business neighbor, or express your concern.

SAY "NO" TO **PANHANDLERS**

As we spend more time outside enjoying the springtime weather, remember to say "NO" to panhandlers. This includes people who may approach you with an elaborate story asking for money.

In one common scam, solicitors will introduce themselves and tell some story about why they are stuck in town and need money to get home. Their car could be broken. Or they may say that a robbery put them in the hospital (they may even have a hospital bracelet). Sometimes they may pass off someone else's business card as their own – all in an attempt to seem legitimate. In most cases, not only is this panhandling, it's also fraud.

In such instances, tell the person that Traveler's Aid vouchers are available from Downtown Partnership and suggest they come to our offices at 217 North Charles Street. The vouchers are legit and available to those truly
