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Liquor Advisory Committee

On Thursday June 28th at 7:00 p.m. the Liquor Advisory Committee met with Joe Flynn and his business partner Patrick, the new owners of 1400 Light St. to review their plans for the liquor license. Joe showed us the Business Plan that he had presented to his bank. which includes creating an upscale/casual restaurant, something on the order of The Bicycle, maintaining the "D" 6 day liquor license with closing a 1:00 a.m., using the first floor for a bar/lounge area in front with a dining area and renovated rest rooms and kitchen. and using the second floor for a bar, dining area and unisex restroom. The downstairs dining area will hold about 25 people and the second floor will hold about 45. There will be no "poker" machines nor pool tables, nor outdoor seating. Joe is hopeful that renovation will start in August and they will open by October.

Neighborhood residents and community associations concerned with quality of life issues are at a great disadvantage when it comes to being given timely notification of liquor license changes in their neighborhoods. The present and antiquated Liquor Law (Article 2B of the Annotated Code of Maryland) has the deck stacked against citizen concerns and in favor of licensees.

Prior to the November 2006 election and at the request of the Chairman of the Baltimore City Liquor Advisory Committee (BCLAC), Senator Della sponsored Senate Bill 344 that gives communities a voice with the Board before approving applications for changes and transfers. As a direct result of the passage of SB 344, the BCLAC reached an agreement with members of the Liquor Board under Chairman Mark Fosler to change the notification procedure to be at least thirty days. This agreement with former Chairman Fosler did not automatically carry forward to the present Liquor Board under Chairman Stephen Fogleman, although the Board has honored all requests for postponements that we have presented. The BCLAC will be working with the present Chairman to reactivate the agreement reached with the previous administration.

Under the current provisions of Article 2B, "proper" notification to residents and communities of liquor license change requests can be a simple as only requiring a cardboard sign (approx. 24" x 36") to be posted by the Liquor Inspector on the door or in the window

B'more Green

Remember my list of things in the March issue that you can do to decrease global warming? Here's another idea that goes under the "easy" category: replace your light bulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs). For those of you who have no idea what I'm talking about, here's the 411 on CFLs.

WHAT: Compact fluorescent light bulbs are those weird looking swirl (or twist) light bulbs, although many now come in globes and look like regular bulbs. Buy the color "neutral" to get a similar light shade as an incandescent bulb. Here is a chart to know which CFL wattage to buy:

Incandescent Bulb	=	Compact Fluorescent Bulb
40 watts		9-12 watts
60 watts		13-18 watts
75 watts		19-24 watts
100 watts		25-30 watts

WHERE: Hardware stores, Costco, IKEA, online, almost anywhere that a regular light bulb is sold. They may not be labeled as compact fluorescent so read the packaging. Look for the Energy Star label.

WHEN: Available in stores now. Change every 5-7 years (talk about low maintenance!).

WHY: CFLs are 40% more efficient than incandescent light bulbs. This decreased use of electricity is what makes them so environmentally friendly.

HOW: Install into your light fixture, no conversion kit needed. However, if you have a dimmer, you must buy a CFL made for dimmers.

COST: CFLs are more expensive upfront but because they last for up to 7 years they end up being more economical in the long run. Cheaper brands may flicker so test a brand before you replace every light bulb in your home.

Here are some cool facts. If every household in the United States replaced one incandescent light bulb with a CFL bulb, it would be the equivalent of reducing the greenhouse gases created by one million cars. If every household replaced five incandescent light bulbs with CFLs, it would be the equivalent of taking 8 million cars off the road for a year. The average house has 15-30 bulbs. Imagine the huge decrease in global warming that we can achieve with such an easy change.

Even if you're not convinced by the environmental factor, how about the money factor? The Fannie Mae corporation estimates that over the course of 8 years a CFL will cost you \$24 while an incandescent will cost you \$51.50. Co-op America says that you will save \$45 per light bulb because CFLs last for so long. And StopGlobalWarming.org reports that if you replace three frequently used light bulbs in your house with CFLs, it will save you, on average, \$60 a year.

Because CFLs contain mercury, they cannot be disposed of with regular household trash. Baltimore City accepts CFLs at the household hazardous materials drop off which occurs twice a year. Call 311 for more information. Go to www.earth911.com or www.lamprecycle.org to find a place near your home where they are recycled year round. You can also drop off all brands of CFLs at IKEA for recycling.



of the establishment for 10 consecutive days, along with a microscopic ad placed in three newspapers in the legal section for the same 10 days. Some change notices will be posted in the legal section of three newspapers for 10 days followed by a hearing notice posted on the Liquor Board website with a hearing date set a few days later. If citizens or a community group misses the posted or advertised notice and therefore do not attend the scheduled hearing, they lose the chance to voice their concerns and the change request may be easily approved by the Liquor Board without opposition. Under this ten-day notification process, only by being vigilant (or by sheer chance) does a community have the opportunity to request a postponement of a hearing. When granted a postponement, the community leaders then have the opportunity to meet with the licensee to discuss their concerns. If the residents and/or community group still oppose the expansion or change, they still have the right to attend the hearing and voice their concerns to the Liquor Commissioners. The Commissioners may more than likely vote in favor of the licensee,

or encourage the community and licensee to come to a mutual agreement that may not make everyone happy.

The lack of sufficient notification is unacceptable and can only be righted by changes in the liquor laws. First we must understand that liquor licenses in Baltimore City and the laws governing those licenses are controlled by the State. The Maryland State Legislature, more specifically the six Baltimore City State Senators, by a procedure known as "local courtesy" can make or change certain laws without objection from Senators of other jurisdictions. In addition to having the power to change the liquor laws, the six Baltimore City State Senators recommend to the Governor the three individuals that will serve as the Liquor Board Chairman and Commissioners who interpret and enforce the liquor laws. Senator Della's 46th Legislative District has a very large percentage of the total liquor licenses in Baltimore City (total city liquor licenses 1,470).
