Therefore, the will of the membership, as expressed in motions carried at general meetings, shall always express the will of the South Baltimore Improvement Committee, and all officers, agents, and committees of SBIC must faithfully represent and abide by all decisions of the General Membership so long as those decisions do

not violate these Bylaws and established rules of procedure.

[Original language—"The will of the membership, as expressed in motions carried at general meetings, shall be the supreme authority of the South Baltimore Improvement Committee, and all officers, agents, and committees of SBIC must faithfully represent and abide by all decisions of the general membership."— places the GM in conflict with the bylaws and all established procedures]

3. Each member shall be required to pay membership dues once during each calendar year (January 1 to December 31). The General Membership shall set the annual dues amount at a regular meeting. Members who pay their dues in November or December will be considered members in good standing for the duration of that calendar year and the totality of the following year.

[Allows setting of dues and without amending bylaws; sets a specific membership year]

Article IV. General Membership Meetings

1. General Membership meetings shall be held monthly on a regularly scheduled night. With as much prior notice as possible, the Executive Board may suspend a monthly General Membership meeting during the summer months and the holiday season. The Executive Board may also decide to reschedule a monthly meeting whose date conflicts with other events.

[Puts bylaws in line with current practice]

Article V. Officers

4. Removal of officers

Any Officer may be removed at any time by the following procedure:

At a regular General Membership meeting with a quorum in attendance, an SBIC member in good standing for at least 30 days may make a motion of removal of one officer, which must be seconded by another member in good standing for at least 30 days. A vote of two-thirds of present members in good standing for at least 30 days will remove the officer, who may not run for any SBIC position until the next regular election or for one year, whichever is longer. At no time will a motion for removal address the removal of more than one officer.

b. At a regular Executive Board meeting with a quorum in attendance, an Executive Board member may make a motion of removal of one officer, which must be seconded by another Executive Board member. A majority vote of Executive Board members present will pass the motion, which will be presented as an "executive resolution" at the next regular General Membership meeting. This executive resolution will require no second. A majority vote of present members in good standing for at least 30 days will remove the officer, who may not

carriage house behind the B&B on Olive St. They plan to market the bed-and-breakfast to business travelers, families of hospital patients, and families of students. Parking will be located underneath the carriage house and in a lot down Olive Street that they will lease. The owners are asking for a variance for the use (a bed-and-breakfast) and for the separate residence for the innkeepers/owners in the rear. No hearing has been scheduled with the BMZA yet; they are trying to present to the nearby neighborhood associations first.

The owner of No Idea Tavern, Jason Zink, came to let residents know that he will be asking the BMZA for outdoor seating. He is asking for 4 tables, either two seaters or four-seaters. The seating would take 10 feet of the sidewalk and leave 6 feet for pedestrian traffic. He petitioned for outdoor seating last year and did not succeed; some neighbors supported the plan and others did not (SBIC sent a letter of support last year). He plans to use the seating for marketing and to let people enjoy the weather. He will take the tables inside in the evening, and thinks this would improve the problems with loitering and other activity in the area. No hearing with the BMZA has been scheduled yet, but it will likely happen in early October.

Nel Andrews from the Community Conferencing Center came to let people know about the upcoming South Baltimore community conference. It is set for Wednesday 9/26 at 6 PM in the Ella Bailey Recreation Center. Everyone in the community is invited, and she plans for residents to talk about community concerns and how to be more effectively engaged in the community and how to address community issues. The end of the conference should result in an action plan for all residents involved. A previous community conference in the area resulted in the Youth Council and in the annual Randall Street block party.

Cynthia Griffin (the Area 30 parking representative) and Bob Harkum (the chair of the RPP Advisory Board) came to discuss the new parking laws now in effect. The September newsletter had a large article detailing these changes. In addition you can see them at www.soboparking.com. Citations for abuse of parking permits and improper use of parking decals have gotten more stringent. Transgressions could result in an entire household losing their parking permits, so take a look at the rules if you're not sure whether you're following them.

We had some food and beverages at the September meeting, and there will be some at the October meeting also. Come join us for refreshments, visiting, speakers, and elections!

B'more Green

Now that you know how bad modern day soda is for you, how about making soda the traditional way. You can satisfy your craving for a fizzy beverage and at the same time drink something that contributes to your health. Here are three quick recipes for traditional sodas from *Nourishing Traditions* by Sally Fallon and Mary Enig.

GINGER ALE: 34 cup ginger, peeled and finely chopped or grated, ½ cup fresh lime juice, ¼-½ cup Rapadura, Sucanut (or other natural sugar), 2 tsp sea salt, ¼ cup whey (see recipe below), 2 cups filtered water. Place all ingredients in a 2 quart jug. Stir well and cover tightly. Leave at room temperature for 2 -3 days before transferring to the fridge. This will keep several months well chilled. Makes 2 quarts.

ORANGINA: juice of 12 oranges, 2 tsp sea salt, ¹/₄ cup whey (see recipe below), ¹/₂ tsp orange extract, 1 ³/₄ quarts filtered water. Place all ingredients in a 2 quart glass container and stir well. Cover tightly. Leave at room tempera-

ture for 2 days before transferring to the fridge. Stir before serving. Makes 2 quarts.

RASPERY DRINK: two 12 ounce packages of frozen raspberries or 2 lbs fresh raspberries, juice of 12 oranges, 1/4 - ½ cup Rapadura, Sucanut (or other natural sugar), 2 tsp sea salt, 1/4 cup whey (see recipe below), about 1 ½ quarts filter water. Place raspberries in a food processor and blend until smooth. Mix in a large bowl with remaining ingredients. Cover with a cloth/ towel and leave at room temperature for 2 days. Skim any foam that may rise to the top. Strain through a strainer lined with a dish towel. Pour into a 2 quart glass container, cover tightly and store in fridge. Makes 2 quarts.

WHEY: Line a strainer with a clean dish towel or cheese cloth and place over a bowl. Pour in a small container of plain yogurt and let stand at room temperature for several hours. The whey will run into the bowl and the leftover milk solids will stay in the

towel. The milk solids are like cream cheese and can be eaten plain or mixed with jam, chives, etc. Store the whey and cream cheese in the fridge. The whey will last for about 6 months in a tightly closed container. The cream cheese will last for about 1 month.

On to a different topic. The Green Festival is being held in DC October 6-7 at the Washington Convention Center. The Green Festival is produced each year by Co-op America and Global Exchange. The website states: "You'll enjoy more than 125 visionary speakers and 350 green businesses, great how-to workshops, green films, a fair trade pavilion, yoga and movement classes, organic beer, delicious organic cuisine and live music." Tickets are \$15 for two days. I highly recommend this event. It's fun, informative and inspiring. If you're unable to attend, you can listen to all the lectures for free on the website after the event, www.greenfestivals.org.

run for any SBIC position until the next regular election or for one year, whichever is longer. At no time will a motion for removal address the removal of more than one officer.

[Standardizes the removal of officers (president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer)]

Article VI. Executive Board

4. Removal of Executive Board members

Any Executive Board member may be removed at any time by following the procedure for removal of officers described in Article V, above.

Article VII. Standing Committees

- 1. Standing Committees will address on-going community concerns and interests. Standing Committees may be formed by the following procedure:
 - a. At an Executive Board meeting, a member of the Executive Board shall move for the formation of a Standing Committee and describe its roles and responsibilities. A majority vote of Executive members present will create a provisional committee.
 - b. The new committee will remain an Ad Hoc Committee for 12 months, and its chair will serve on the Executive Board ex officio for that time. The committee will have all other rights and responsibilities of a Standing Committee, but a majority vote of the Executive Board may termi-




nate the committee at any time during this provisional period.

c. At the end of its 12-month provisional period, the new committee must be approved by a majority of Executive Board members at a regular Executive meeting. Without this Executive approval, the provisional committee will terminate immediately.

d. If the Executive Board has approved the committee, the president will introduce an executive resolution describing the roles and responsibilities of the committee at the next General Membership meeting. A majority vote of members present must approve the executive resolution or the provisional committee will terminate immediately.

2. The president will appoint all Standing Committee chairs, subject to the approval of the General Membership. The chairs will stand for reappointment by the president and reapproval by the membership at each October election meeting. Chairs of the standing committees shall recruit committee members to assist in researching and developing solutions to issues. The standing committee chairs shall present reports to the General Membership at monthly meetings and may present resolutions to be voted on.


