The following is a summary of presentations and New Business from the January 8, 2008 meeting:

1901 Charles Street Project

This project originally proposed to have 64 town homes is now planned as a higher density apartment complex. The complex will be surrounded by Charles, Wells, Marshall and Winder Streets. It will have a mix of 128 efficiencies, one and two bedroom units (total of 360 bedrooms) targeted at young professionals; a parking garage and on-street (Winder) parking, totaling approximately 360 spaces. The developers are seeking SBIC input and a letter of support to the zoning commission

Design Review Committee

At the last GM meeting January 8th, Mr. Brian Dusek of JLB Partners presented the new proposal for the development of 1901 S. Charles Street. This site was rezoned to R-8 and approved to build 64 townhouses in 2006, but the new proposal is to build a complex that will house 188 apartment units with one off-street parking space per bedroom for the entire complex. There will be additional parking on surrounding streets that will be repaired and re-opened to traffic. With the change in the housing market this project should bring some affordable housing to the area that SBIC has always supported. The developers will need a zoning variance for the higher density of the project. A vote was held and the membership approved the variance at the January GM meeting. SBIC will send a letter of support to the BMZA.

Mr. Doug Thomas of Master Plan Builders presented plans to renovate 34 E. Heath Street. Mr. Thomas will make contact with the neighbors and have them sign a letter of support on this project. The Design Review Committee will review the plans and make recommendations to the builder if needed.

SBIC Design Review Committee requires a 30 day notice prior to BMZA hearings to review plans. We will not review plans on short notice and letters of support will not be sent. If you have any questions, I can be reached at 443-790-4520.

Liquor Advisory Committee

The Fort Charles Pub is under contract of sale, and the current liquor license will be transferred to the prospective owners who will change the bar's name to "Taps Baltimore". Public hearings will be held by the Liquor Board on or after February 7, 2008. The prospective owners, David Holter and Jeffrey Londow, have appeared before the SBIC Executive Board and at the SBIC general meeting in January and presented their business plans for this new adventure. David and Jeff have assured the SBIC community that they intend to operate an upscale establishment serving food, wine and beer. They plan to eliminate poker machines, juke box and pool tables and install tables and chairs, seating booths and expand the kitchen. The second floor will be used for events such as weddings and retirement parties with valet parking provided as stated in the original license. They will have on-site security, will strive for an upscale clientele and will seek to avoid the weekend "Cross Street" bar crowd. The new owners assured us that the Taps Baltimore staff will be trained and knowledgeable in the establishment's rules and will enforce them. The new owners are also engaged in talks with local politicians about removing or relocating the bus stop along side the tavern. The SBIC-LAC is presently drafting an agreement with the new owners based on the information that was presented at the two meetings. This agreement is required as a condition for SBIC support of the transfer and will become part of the license. Although not discussed at the general meeting, their liquor license application states that they are also requesting outdoor table service. Should you have any issues or concerns about this transfer, please attend the February general meeting on Tuesday, February 5th at Olive Branch Methodist Church.

The SBIC-LAC is also currently involved with our neighboring communities, FHNA, FHSNA and Sharp/Leadenhall regarding the transfer of liquor license to "Spoons" on Cross Street, which will allow them to serve beer and light wine. The Community Law Center is coordinating the effort with our community associations in negotiating a contract with the owners.

The following establishments were cited on December 3, 2007 and had hearings before the Liquor Board on January 17, 2008 for violation of Rule 4/01 (a): "No licensee shall sell or furnish alcoholic beverages to any person under twenty-one (21) years of age or to any person with the knowledge that such person is purchasing or acquiring such beverages for consumption by any person under twenty-one (21) years of age"

for a required zoning variance from the original project. Motions were passed approving the proposed higher density project on the condition that there be parking in the number of one space per bedroom for the entire complex, and that each rental unit price include one assigned parking space. Steve Zaleskiwicz will draft a letter, which conforms to the approved motions, to the zoning board in support of the project zoning variance request.

Transfer of Fort Charles Pub Liquor License

Jeff Holter and Dave Lando are in the process of purchasing the Fort Charles Pub which they will rename TAPS Baltimore. They plan on making TAPS Baltimore an upscale establishment. They are seeking SBIC's support with the Liquor Board for the transfer of the BD-7 liquor license held by the current owners of the pub. A motion was made to support the transfer of the liquor license to the new owners pending the new owners and SBIC entering a contractual agreement on how the establishment is run and its fit in the community. Al Evans will continue with his efforts to develop such an agreement.

34 E. Heath Street Project

Doug Thomas outlined plans for a 13 foot add-on to the rear of the current structure and a third story add-on. He is seeking SBIC support for the zoning permit required from the city for these changes. SBIC asked that letters be sent out to neighbors about the project seeking their input. Mr. Thomas indicated that the zoning board hearing is scheduled for January 22. He said letters would be sent to neighbors and neighbors canvassed the next day. He will e-mail Steve Zaleskiwicz about these efforts and provide the addresses of those canvassed and addressed letters. Steve, Julie Tice and Dennis Plouff will look into this project further and make a recommendation.


South Baltimore Learning Center Annual Fund Raising Gala


