## The Parking Spot

Just a few notes here pertaining to Parking in Areas A and 30:

As of February 9th, the RPP office has run out of Area 30 decals and will be filling requests for decals with gray placards that are the same size as a visitor's pass. They should be displayed on the driver's side front dash.

Baltimore City has depleted its supply of metal needed to manufacture new parking signs. Therefore all Area A blocks that have been approved for the switch to Area 30 will have their current signs updated to Aarea 30 using stickers supplied by the Parking Authority. You will be notified when your signs are changed. Remember that it is your responsibility to secure Area 30 decals (placards) and visitor passes.

Before joining the BPD he was a Fire Fighter and Medic in Connecticut for five years. Sergeant Kowalczyk began his career with the BPD on foot in the Eastern District. He was then assigned to the South-Eastern where his assignments included Patrol, Operations, Vice and Neighborhood Services. After being promoted to Sergeant in 2007 he was assigned to the Southern District Midnight Shift and finally after over a year in Patrol he has been assigned to The Neighborhood Services Unit for the Southern District. Sergeant Kowalczyk brings a wealth of knowledge to the table including, but not limited to, his Vice expertise as well as being a National Highway Transportation Administration Instructor for the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests, more commonly known as DUI Instructor. Please join me in welcoming him to the Neighborhood Services Unit. I have the utmost confidence that the Neighborhood Services Unit will soon be a model for other Communities to follow!

#### BE AWARE, BE ALERT AND DON'T BE A VICTIM!

While overall reported crime in the SOBO grid is down compared to last year, there has been a significant spike in Robberies. Robberies for December and January of 2008 were at ZERO. For December and January of 2009 there have been SEVEN. This is cause for great concern! The majority of these robberies are being committed with firearms and force. The potential for someone to be seriously injured or killed during the course of one of these cowardly acts is very possible. These criminals are nervous, quick tempered and choose easy targets. The following are a few ways to reduce risk and protect yourself. They have been compiled with the help of BCPD, FBI and ATF.

- Avoid as much as possible, being alone on foot at night or in isolated places, even during the day
- -Make brief but confident eye contact with other pedestrians. This shows you are aware of them as well as your surroundings.
- -If out at night, stay in well lit public places.
- -Walk briskly with your head up and don't distract yourself by wearing headphones or talking on your cell phone.
- -Upon entering your car LOCK THE DOORS! Don't hesitate to use your horn loudly if you sense danger.
- -Trust your instincts! If someone seams to be following you, making you uncomfortable or if a situation "just doesn't feel right", get out of the area, get help and get among other people!
- -Practice being conscious of who is in your proximity and of a place to quickly go in the event of an emergency.



## **Design Review**

Ill W. Heath St.- This project was approved for 29 apartments with parking and is now offered up for sale. Unable to get any information from selling agents at this time. I will report when information becomes available.

1201 S. Charles St.- Mr. Adam Smolen at our January meeting proposed to erect a Boutique Hotel with 93 rooms and no on site parking at this site. The overall height of this building at roof top level would be 85Ft. this is 35ft. taller then any building in the neighborhood. This will be 50ft. taller then any residential property in the area. Those impacted the most by this height will be the home owners in the surrounding area. The height of the building is the main contention of this project.

I urge everyone that lives in the surrounding area of 1201 S. Charles St., the intersection of S. Charles & West St. to be vigil of any posting of public hearings for this project. There maybe a sign posted in the near future concerning a Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals (BMZA) hearing for this project. The sign must have the date, time and location of the hearing and be posted 10 days prior to the hearing. BMZA hearings are held in Room 215, City Hall, 100 N. Holiday Street on alternate Tuesdays at 1:30 p.m. Every citizen has the right to voice their opinions at these hearings. If you have concerns about this project this is a must hearing to be present and be heard.

1452 Light St.- This project looks like it just stalled. Unable to get return call from owner posted on permit, I will keep trying to get information and report on it.

1500 S. Hanover St.- Know as the Vine will soon have a new name and operator when construction is completed. Brian McComas, owner of Ryleigh's stated that there will be a great menu and that Chef Patrick Morrow will be in charge .New name will be Avery's Pearl. The transfer of the Liquor License is currently being sought. This sounds like it will be a great place to dine.

1901 S. Charles St.- This project was approved for 188 apartments with parking. Scott Benjamin one of the owners informed me that there was issues with CSX and everything has been resolved and that they look for demo work to begin in early spring.

Steve Zaleskiwicz's 70<sup>th</sup> birthday was celebrated with cake and ice cream. Amy Mutch briefly outlined Steve's background growing-up and living in Baltimore and his extensive contribution of time and service to the community.

*Vice President*—Greg Blake, a Charles Street resident, was put forth as a candidate for vice president of the association. He was duly elected by a general membership vote.

Michael Dannenberg of the Baltimore City Department of Social Services gave a presentation in support of foster care and adoption services. The State hopes to have 1,000 new foster care/adoption homes in operation in Maryland by 2010, with 600 of those in the city. The city provides weekly presentations, every Tuesday at 1910 N Broadway on foster care and adoption. There is an 8 week process for gaining approval to become a foster parent. If a person is approved for foster care, they are also approved to be an adoptive parent. The State provides stipends to foster parents, and does so in some cases for adoptive parents.

Ian Hines of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhoods reported on: the City budget; Be Fit Baltimore about physical fitness awareness; a form for entering the contest to name the city's coming free shuttle service; and Neighborhood Concerns: A Recipe for Success a flier with information for dealing with community issues. The proposed new trash collection process being considered by the city. He said that this would be a dramatic overhaul to the existing system intended to improve the quality and effectiveness of service, while also saving money. Meeting attendees provided feedback, regarding the effectiveness of the proposed changes and contingencies that should be considered in finalizing the new trash collection procedures. Providing trash cans has been tried before, but not all residents have an easy place to store the bigger trash bins. Elderly folks will have difficulty dealing with large trash bins as well. Quality of enforcement hearings on the proposed changes to trash collection will be open to the public.

Announcements—Amy Mutch announced the coming Federal Hill Main Street sponsored event "Festivals" to be held on March 14 at the Museum of Industry. Food, drink and entertainment will be provided. Tickets purchased beforehand from Amy (they will be available at the March GM meeting) or on the main street web site are \$60. They are \$75 at the door of the event.





### **Clean and Green**

As many of you know, the City has announced that changes will be implemented to improve its trash and recycling collection programs. Celeste Amato, the Director for the Initiative for a Cleaner Greener Baltimore, or another representative from the Office of the Mayor will be present at our March General Meeting to discuss these changes in detail and address any concerns you may have. Please plan to attend. A summary of the information presented and any Q&A will be available to you if you cannot make it to the meeting.

For now, a summary of the proposed changes is as follows:

Operational changes include revising routes in a more rational way utilizing natural boundaries for greater efficiency and beginning collection at 6am, as opposed to 7am. All pick-ups will be scheduled between Tuesday and Friday – there will be no Monday pick-ups, but Saturday "make-up" collection days will be scheduled in the instance of a holiday. Operational changes are planned to be in effect on July 1<sup>st</sup>.

Changes involving the reduction of trash pick-up from twice to once weekly, and the increase in recycling pick-up from twice monthly to once weekly will require legislative approval. There will be a hearing in April which will be publicly announced.


As you have probably heard, it is proposed that Cityowned 64-gallon trash bins be assigned to each residence. Because of the various types of residences in the City, this program will be established on a community-by-community basis. Personal and household preferences will not be honored, beyond choosing a smaller receptacle – 32-gallon trash bins will be available. For some neighborhoods, trash collection will continue as it is, although the program would become more stringent, and fines may be issued for trash disposed of in plastic bags, especially the night prior to trash collection. For communities or blocks to be waived out of the proposed changes, there must be no rear yard access, but front-of-house pick-up, so that the trash bin would physically have to be moved through the house.

As related to the can changes, the City would retrofit its current trucks to easily unload the garbage from the bin.

As a reminder, NO TRASH is to be stored outside in plastic garbage bags or placed outside in plastic bags on the night prior to trash collection. Anyone storing trash outside in anything other than a container with a tightly fitting lid will be subject to citation.

Looking forward --- Mark your calendar for the Mayor's Clean Up on Saturday, April 18<sup>th</sup>, and give your block a nice spring cleaning! Bags, brooms, and other tools will be provided. Further details to be announced.

Thyroid disease is one of the most common endocrine diseases we see in our furry friends. The thyroid gland is located in the neck near the trachea ("windpipe"). The gland has two lobes, one on either side of the trachea. The thyroid gland produces thyroid hormone which regulates the body's metabolism. Thyroid hormone affects several different organ systems. Therefore, any abnormalities in the production of thyroid hormone can lead to many different symptoms.

Hypothyroidism occurs when the thyroid gland is not producing enough thyroid hormone. This syndrome is seen in dogs, typically middle aged to older. Symptoms include weight gain despite normal food intake, lethargy, reluctance to exercise, seeking areas of warmth, dull, dry and thinning hair, excessive shedding, high blood cholesterol and sometimes neurologic signs such as dragging feet and lack of coordination. Blood testing is required to diagnose hypothyroidism. Total Thyroxin level (TT4) is the most commonly used screening test. If the TT4 is low normal or below normal a second thyroid test called Free T4 by Equilibrium Dialysis is performed in order to make a definitive diagnosis. Hypothyroidism is treated by giving an oral form of replacement hormone. This treatment continues for the rest of the dog's life. Periodic blood testing is required to monitor the thyroid levels in the blood in order to make any necessary dose adjustments to the medication.

Hyperthyroidism occurs when the thyroid gland is producing too much thyroid hormone. This syndrome occurs in cats, typically middle aged or older. Clinical signs typically include weight loss despite an increased, even voracious, appetite, increased drinking, increased urination, vomiting, diarrhea, behavior changes, and unkempt haircoat. Hyperthyroidism often causes increased blood pressure and heart problems. Blood testing is required to diagnose hyperthyroidism. Blood chemistry, complete blood cell counts and urinanalysis are used to assess the overall health of the cat. TT4 and Free T4 by ED levels are used to diagnose hyperthyroidism. If symptoms of heart disease are present chest x-rays, ECG and sometimes echocardiography are performed. Blood pressure is often measured as well. Different therapies are available to treat hyperthyroidism. Daily oral medication is available with periodic blood testing required to monitor thyroid levels. Radioactive Iodine therapy is another very effective treatment. It is given by injection and it destroys the abnormal thyroid tissue responsible for secreting too much thyroid hormone. This treatment is provided at veterinary hospitals licensed to administer radiation therapy. Surgical removal of the affected thyroid tissue is a third treatment option.

Treating thyroid disease in dogs and cats is typically very successful. Affected pets can live long, happy and healthy lives with regular visits to a veterinarian, periodic blood testing a dedicated pet owner willing to give medication on a regular basis.

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
## Swing Into Spring at Riverside Stage
