#### **MEETING MINUTES**

#### GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

#### 05/03/2011

#### **Police/Community Relations**

Officer Butterbean began the meeting by reporting on the status of crime in our area. An armed robbery occurred recently at Sam's grocery store at Randall and S. Charles. Three home burglaries occurred in the last 28 days in our area. Auto larceny has increased.

He reminded us again that it is unwise to place empty boxes out for recycling pick-up that indicate major purchases that have been made – TV boxes etc. Break the boxes down and conceal them.

A general discussion took place regarding excessive drinking and unruliness by bar patrons. Officer Butterbean suggested that the situation would be improved if bars would simply cut off serving drinks to customers that are obviously intoxicated. The bars need to take on more responsibility.

Residents have the ability to challenge liquor license renewals and therefore have more power than the police to affect change.

Fire occupancies are posted at the front doors of bars and restaurants. The police can enforce occupancy codes and shut down establishments.

All liquor license violations that are written up by the police are reviewed by the Liquor Board.

In response to a question, he related that citations can be issued by the police to anyone breaking the law. He thought the citation fine amounts to \$150. The individual will be sent to Central Booking if he/she doesn't have an ID, exhibits physical misbehavior or has a criminal record. Citation fees enter the City General Fund, not the police budget. Police cannot be a revenue generator.

Sgt. Kowalczyk related that the Hospitality Association contracts with the City to pay overtime to 3 additional officers and 1 additional supervisor for deployment to the Cross Street area on Friday and Saturday nights until 3:00 AM. The other regular 4 officers are still available to patrol the residential neighborhoods. Starting at 1:30 on Friday and Saturday nights, the extra officers focus on helping bar patrons leave the area instead of entering the residential neighborhoods.

#### **Design Review**

The proposed project at 127 W. Fort Ave. and its three zoning variance requests were discussed. Stephan Lawrence, a member of the SBNA Design Review Committee, related that residents in the vicinity of the project have organized to oppose the zoning variances. 112 signatures in opposition have been obtained and the residents will attend the Zoning Board hearing on May 10.

#### Parking Report

Debbie Alt reported that SBNA has agreed to terms with the West Federal Hill Neighborhood Association and that Cynthia Griffin of that Association will continue as the Area 30 Parking Representative. Debbie will continue as the Area 42 Parking Representative.

Area 30 residents can become members of the West Federal Hill Association, but cannot be SBNA members concurrently.

Cynthia reported that the following are open work orders with the Transportation Department and/or the Parking Authority:

Parking signs at 36 to 50 E. Fort (Recently installed)

Parking signs at 41 to 45 E. Fort (Have not been installed yet)

Parking signs at 5 to 17 E. Fort (Need to be replaced)

"No stopping" signs on the 1600 block of Patapsco. (Need to be replaced)

An application has been submitted for a handicap parking space in the 1400 block of S. Charles.

Parking enforcement will be active until 3:00 PM on Sunday, June 5, during the Jazz and Blues Festival.

Some transportation improvements that affect our neighborhood were announced in the Middle Branch Transportation Plan meeting held in April at the Christ Lutheran Church:

Installation of traffic circle at Key Highway and Light St.

Repair of on-ramp from northbound Hanover to southbound I-95. (Currently under repair and closed)

New Red White and Blue Circulator loop to Ft. McHenry – this circulator loop will connect with the Ostend Street Purple Line stop. More info will be provided when available.

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Other conceptual proposals featured in the in the Middle Branch Transportation Plan include:

Hanover/Ostend intersection - northbound and eastbound left turn lanes (conceptual stage)

Hanover and Fort intersection - northbound and southbound left turn lanes (conceptual stage)

Other items of interest - when purchasing a new car, remove the parking decal off the windshield of the old car. Even if it is shredded, it can be exchanged for a new decal for a new car. Also, Four (4) one-day party passes per residence are available on non-stadium event days. All party passes must be for the same day and are not available for consecutive days.

## Sicily...

We took a family trip to Sicily last month.. I went with my husband's family to visit their relatives living in the sleepy little towns of Falcone and Montagnareale, Italy. The trip was a huge deal to my mother-in-law and her brother, Uncle Phil. They had never been to the old country but their parents had told many stories about life in Sicily and those childhood stories came to life during our trip. They grew up listening to magical tales of fields of lemon trees and rugged coastlines- and that is exactly what Sicily delivered. Sicily was truly breathtaking, I have to admit.

The family had been invited to a holiday party that celebrated Montagnareale's "community organization" and the 100th anniversary of 27 men

that left Sicily in 1911 for the new country in search of work and prosperity. My husband's great-grandfather was one of the 27 and also, at one time, president of this community organization, which had been a great honor. Montagnareale was a small, country town, population of 1,700, nestled into the side of a mountain. (Think of the Godfather wedding scene in Sicily... that town was not far away actually) The people of Montagnareale were thrilled to have the grandchildren and great grandchildren of the 27 men return to Sicily for the 100th anniversary and they built a statue of hands shaking to honor their return. The statue now sits in the middle of the town square.

Besides the food, the hospitality and the glorious terrain off of the Mediterranean Sea... what really made an impression on me was the feeling of community in Montagnareale. The citizens of Montagnareale were sophisticated and gracious, the town was spotless and filled with flower pots and citrus trees and the residents were so warm and welcoming. They talked of the importance of their community organi-



zation and how many years ago, the 27 men had sent money to the organization for decades to keep the citizens and families alive during hard times- during both world wars. The community organization had provided aid, without the help of the government, to their residents when there were no jobs or food. This vital organization and the brave men that had left had saved the town, and the current residents vowed to keep the organization alive today, even when the problems of the town are much smaller than before. The citizens of Montagnareale had not forgotten my husband's great- grandfather even after all these years, and they honored him by giving my mother-in-law a beautiful plaque. They also fed us a 15 course meal at a restaurant on an organic farm, which was quite an experience.

What I learned from this enchanting little town, was that community and history were important. What I saw in the citizens was investment; permanent investment, even generational investment. Not just monetary investment in houses or property, but personal investment in their neighborhood, in each other. What I saw in Montagnareale were deep roots and a commitment to a better life in their community.

#### Anything else??


